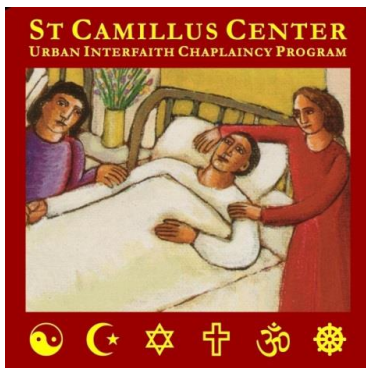

Keynote Speaker: Fr Greg Boyle, Homeboy Industries

Homeboy Industries is a [youth program](#) founded in 1992^[1] by [Father Greg Boyle, S.J.](#) following the work of the [Christian base communities](#) at Dolores Mission Church. The program is intended to assist high-risk youth, former [gang](#) members and the recently incarcerated with a variety of free programs, such as mental health counseling, legal services, tattoo removal, curriculum and education classes, work-readiness training, and employment services. The most distinctive feature of Homeboy Industries^[2] is its social enterprises and small businesses, which give hard-to-place individuals an opportunity for employment in transitional jobs in a safe, supportive environment where they can learn both concrete and soft job skills.

Among the businesses^[3] are the Homeboy Bakery, Homegirl Café^[4] & Catering, Homeboy/Girl Merchandise, Homeboy Farmers Markets, The Homeboy Diner at City Hall,^[5] Homeboy Silkscreen & Embroidery, Homeboy Grocery and Homeboy Cafe & Bakery in the American Airlines terminal at Los Angeles International Airport.^[6] (from [Wikipedia](#))
